Taking these important shortcomings, and the changes in positions of the fielders, into consideration, it is a wonder they came out so well. Gavagan put two men out on a fine catch from the bat and throw to a base, and Taylor at right field deserved all praise; a carriage prevented his making a clear home run. The Atlantics' batting was generally first-rate, out P. O'Brien was not as successful as usual in the feid. Where is it possible to find perfection at all times? Although all fielded finely, Smith, Pierce and M. O'Brien seemed to excel most. A collation was given to the Atlantics by the Mutuals, at which much interchange of good-feeling took place, and the balk was presented by Mr. Wildey, with some appropriate remarks, to Mr. Tassey, President of the Atlantics, who made most friendly response, which was received by both parties with cheers. The Press was not forgotten amid the hilarity; and the Atlantics departed with another trophy to add to the many wellearned laurels they have won.
