Base Ball.

ATLANTIC VS. MUTUAL.

The result of the grand match between these clubs last week is the all-absorbing topic of conversation in base ball circles this week—the one-sided report in one of the morning papers, and the denial of the allegations therein made, which appeared the next day, having anything but a tendency to create a good feeling between the contestants. However, the great question in regard to the superiority of one or the other of these rival organizations will soon be settled, for on Monday next the second and decisive match is to take place on the Capitoline Grounds, Bedford, at which locality Superintendent FALK, of Brooklyn, will reign supreme, and his well known opposition to the rowdy element will insure a clear field for the match, and prevent the possibility of any outside interference, let the result be ever so close. Until Monday, therefore, the question will remain in abeyance. The most important contest to take place in the interim is the grand match between the champion clubs of New-Jersey and Pennsylvania, viz.: the Eureka and Athletic Clubs, the match being played on the Athletic grounds, Philadelphia, to-morrow at 3 P. M., on the corner of Twenty-fifth and Jefferson streets.

STAR VS. ENTERPRISE.

The return game between these Brooklyn clubs, which took place on Saturday on the Capitoline Grounds, Bedford, resulted in a victory for the stars by a score of 47 to 38, in a full game occupying three hours and a half, the last innings not being closed until 7:30 P. M., when it was almost too dark to record game, much less to see the ball. Owing to the rain it was 4 P. M. before the players were enabled to get to work, and then the ball was soon so wet, "saggy" and slippery that good fielding was quite out of the question, and the contest became a trial of skill in batting, the result being in favor of the Stars, they scoring in the eighth innings no less than 19 runs. Up to the seventh innings the game was very evenly contested, the score standing at the close of the second innings 6 to 6; then 13 to 13; then 17 to 15—Enterprise ahead; then 21 to 20—Star ahead; then 25 to 22—Enterprise ahead; and finally 30 to 26, the Stars in the minority, the eighth inning's batting winning the game, although in the ninth the Enterprise scored 5 to 2. Mr. GALVIN, of the Atlantic, acted as Umpire, and observed the sixth and thirty-ninth rules with more strictness than was ever done before, players having their bases given them four times on three balls, and that too with three balls in succession. This is the only way to put a stop to wild pitching, and it is to be hoped the example will be followed.

UNION OF MORRISIANA VS. PHILADELPHIA CLUBS.

The Union club returned from their four days' visit to Philadelphia on Saturday, they having won three games out of four played, the Unions, like the Stars, finding the Athletics too strong for them. They began play with the Camden Club on Wednesday, winning easily by a score of 31 to 5. On Thursday they played the Athletics, and were defeated by a score of 26 to 13. On Friday they defeated the Olympics by a score of 25 to 13, and on Saturday the Keystones by a score of 24 to 7, five innings only being played in the last game. Hudson led the score at the bat in the programme, thereby taking the first prize offered for the best score made by the Union runs. NICHOLSON taking the second prize. The total score of the game played was 93 to 51 in favor of the Unions, the Stars and their games scoring 131 to 107, the Resolutes scoring in their three games but 86 to 135. The result of the match between the Athletics and Unions will add interest to the Eureka match to-morrow. The Unions were hospitably entertained by all the clubs, but the Athletics gave them a splendid feast at the St. James' Hotel, besides taking them to the Academy of Fine Arts, U. S. Mint, &c.
